THE YEAR AT CURZON SCHOOL (2018)

This has been another successful year for Curzon School with a "good" grading from Ofsted following a visit by inspectors in October when they commented in particular on the good quality of education conducted in a safe and stimulating environment.

More recently in April, Oxford Diocese sent an inspector to assess the school under the SIAMS framework (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools). The school retained its "outstanding" grading noting an exceptionally clear and powerful Christian ethos with its values of courtesy, confidence, competence, consideration, cooperation and respect.

This reflects well on the links with the parish and Peter's efforts in developing and sustaining the faith aspects of the school.

To add to these, the next head boy at Holmer Green Secondary School is a former Curzon pupil for the second year running. Numbers at the school are bearing up well despite a dip in demographics in Buckinghamshire and the end of the academic year leaves it with a financial surplus although challenges lie ahead from changes in the funding formula and inevitable increases in costs. The question of joining a MAT (Multi Academy Trust) is under careful consideration although the matter is complex and no conclusion has been reached at this stage.

The year's achievements are an amalgam of hard work by the Head, Mrs Coles, her team of teachers and support staff, governors and volunteer helpers, not forgetting those who devoted their time to the school fete and came as visitors. *AH*
